About Today's Concert

John Montanari, Artistic Director

The three works on today's program, composed within the span of just sixteen years, present a summary of where music had been, where music was, and where music was going around the turn of the 20th century. Along the way, the string quartet sonority will be on display in all its myriad shades and hues, much like a New England fall landscape.

It may seem quaint now, but in musical circles of the late nineteenth century, one was strictly either a Brahms person – an upholder of absolute music and traditional musical values – or a Liszt & Wagner person – a true believer in the melding of music and literature, with Liszt's tone poems and Wagner's operas as the ideal. Hugo Wolf, in both his composition and voluminous musical criticism, was a Liszt & Wagner guy all the way. Accordingly, Brahms was target number one of his acidulous pen. Of the Piano Concerto No. 1, Wolf wrote, "The air that blows through this composition is so icy, dank and foggy that it could easily freeze your heart and take your breath away; you could catch a cold from it. Unhealthy stuff!" After hearing the Symphony No. 4, Wolf wrote that Brahms "has mastered the art of composing without ideas."

As a composer, Wolf is almost exclusively known for his exquisite lieder (art songs), which set poetry by Mörike, Goethe, Eichendorff and others with great sensitivity and harmonic imagination. Along with his early String Quartet in D Minor (check it out on YouTube when you have 45 minutes to spare), the "Italian Serenade" of 1887 is Wolf's sole contribution to chamber music, and makes a charming, virtually Rossinian overture to today's festivities.

About Today's Concert (cont.)

In a mature creative life of about 35 years, Maurice Ravel produced only about twelve hours of music. Today's Quartet, completed in 1903 at the age of 28 while finishing his studies at the Paris Conservatoire, was an early breakthrough for Ravel, who had failed to win the prestigious Prix de Rome on three occasions. (The winners on those occasions were André Caplet, Aymé Kunc and Raoul Laparra. Heard any of their works lately?) Obviously modeled on the Quartet from ten years earlier by Claude Debussy, who approved of the younger composer's work, Ravel's Quartet, with all its colorful sonorité and touches of exoticism, is also a work of classical poise, revealing Ravel's admiration of the quartets of Haydn.

Imagine attaining sufficient skill on the violin to join one of Europe's finest orchestras, only to switch to clarinet three years later – and to become so compelling a player as to entice the most famous composer of the day to come out of retirement to composer four great works for you. This was the story of Richard Mühlfeld (1856-1907), principal clarinetist of the Meiningen Court Orchestra, which was celebrated for its performances of works by Brahms, who also occasionally conducted the ensemble.

After hearing Mühlfeld, nicknamed "Fräulein Klarinette" and "Meine Prima Donna" by Brahms, play the Mozart Clarinet Quintet and other works, the composer, who had called it quits after his String Quintet No. 2, was inspired to compose the Clarinet Trio, Op. 114, the two Clarinet Sonatas, Op. 120, and of course, today's Clarinet Quintet, Op. 115. Not to offer any spoilers, but if, after the conclusion of the Brahms Quintet, you clap really hard, you might bring forth not Tinkerbell but Wolfgang Amadeus himself.

Artist Information

Quartetto di Cremona

Quartetto di Cremona is celebrated as one of the world's preeminent string quartets, renowned for its lustrous sound, refined musicianship, and stylistic versatility across a vast repertoire.

Founded in 2000 at the Accademia Walter Stauffer in Cremona, Italy—the historical home of master luthiers like Stradivari, Amati, and Guarneri—the quartet carries the immense weight of this Italian musical heritage. The ensemble, whose members have played together since 2002, was granted honorary citizenship by the city of Cremona in 2015, formalizing their deep connection. Their artistry is frequently amplified by extraordinary instruments, having performed and recorded on the legendary Paganini Quartet of Stradivari instruments. In their regular performances, the musicians are supported by the Kulturfond Peter Eckes with superb Italian instruments, which often include a Nicola Amati violin and a Dom Nicola Amati cello.

The past three years have been marked by significant milestones in the quartet's international touring and recording projects. The quartet made its highly-anticipated Carnegie Hall debut in New York in October 2023, following its acclaimed Lincoln Center debut in 2022. The latter was praised by The Strad for its "splendid balance, abundant colour and a relaxed mastery of all the musical elements." They released an ambitious and innovative new recording of J.S. Bach's The Art of the Fugue on Orchid Classics, an ensemble-arranged version performed with a total of seven instruments. This recording project was developed to celebrate their 25th Career Anniversary (2025).

The ensemble also celebrated its 25th anniversary with an extensive World Tour throughout the 2024/2025 season, featuring

performances across Europe, North America, and Asia.

Quartetto di Cremona maintains an expansive repertoire, masterfully moving between the classical canon and contemporary works. They are particularly acclaimed for their deep engagement with the Austro-German masters, with their complete cycle of Beethoven's String Quartets receiving high praise and winning prestigious awards like the ECHO Klassik and ICMA honors. Critics frequently cite their ability to deliver performances that possess "exemplary technique and intonational purity" while avoiding "19th-century rhetoric."

Beyond Beethoven, the quartet champions the music of their home country, with notable recordings dedicated to Italian composers such as Verdi, Respighi, and Boccherini.

The quartet is passionately dedicated to education, serving as Professors at the Walter Stauffer Academy in Cremona, where they guide the next generation of professional string quartets. Awarded the prestigious Franco Buitoni Award in 2019, the Quartetto di Cremona is a major force in promoting and encouraging chamber music worldwide.

David Shifrin

Clarinetist David Shifrin is one of the world's most distinguished soloists, recitalists, and chamber music collaborators. A winner of both the Avery Fisher Career Grant and the prestigious Avery Fisher Prize (2000), Mr. Shifrin is celebrated for his profound musicianship and commitment to expanding the repertoire for his instrument.

His career includes appearances as a soloist with major orchestras across the United States and abroad, as well as holding

Principal Clarinet positions with renowned ensembles like the Cleveland Orchestra and the American Symphony Orchestra (under Leopold Stokowski).

A preeminent figure in chamber music, Mr. Shifrin served as Artistic Director of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center from 1992 to 2004 and Chamber Music Northwest from 1981 through 2020. He continues his deep dedication to the genre as the Artistic Director of the Phoenix Chamber Music Festival and Yale's Oneppo Chamber Music Society.

An influential educator, Mr. Shifrin is the Samuel S. Sanford Professor in the Practice of Clarinet at the Yale School of Music, where he has taught since 1987. He has been instrumental in commissioning and championing over 100 works by 20th and 21st-century American composers.

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
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
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
